





Year 1 have enjoyed another busy week. They began by writing their innovated versions of the Gruffalo story. It was wonderful looking at how much progress they have all made with their writing so far this year. In Maths we have been exploring volume and capacity - a great topic to explore at bath time with a variety of containers! The children have learnt the story 'We're going on a Bear hunt' and begun making our own class story 'We're going on an (Easter) Bunny hunt'! At forest school we enjoyed the sunshine and spent some time listening to see what we could hear - there were many birds. We ended the week with a visit from Dr Tiffany who is a dentist and helped us all learn about looking after our teeth.

























There was great excitement on Wednesday as on our way to Forest School, we spotted a toad! it created an extraordinary amount of chat, about where it had come from and where it may be going. Once we got to Forest School we were looking for different types of soils and rocks we could find.

In English, we finished our story starter for our Stone Troll story. In Maths, we have been focusing on our 3s, 4s, and 8 times tables. For science we investigated different types of soils and have begun to code using scratch in computing.




















" In coding, we are using the Scratch program and we had a challenge to make a Maths quiz with times tables questions. We need to have a backdrop, sprite, sound and questions. It was a little bit hard at first because some of us were using it for the first time. After we explored it more, it got easier. It is a fun challenge!

In English, we have read our new model text story - The King of the Fishes. We found out the meanings of some tricky words in sentences e.g. the waves stilled, silvery voice, winter winds whip through the house. We also learned new vocabulary about the different parts of a river and are creating collage posters to show the information. Look out in our next news to see our colourful, interesting posters!"



We celebrated British Science week by exploring the topic of light with some fun and interesting investigations! This included how light travels from a light source to how light enters the eye!























Information letter: Fifth Disease

Dear Parents

Please be informed that we have a few confirmed cases of "Fifth Disease" within our school. This disease, which manifests itself through little red spots or red cheeks and sometimes a fever/temperature, mainly occurs with younger children. The spots may spread out over the body but will disappear again after approximately a week. Sometimes they may reappear shortly in the following weeks. The children will often not feel sick from the disease.

Children who show symptoms of Fifth Disease but do not feel sick, can continue to come to school. The contamination time can range from one to three weeks prior to the symptoms showing. Adults with Fifth Disease that do not feel sick can continue to come to school.

Adults who have had Fifth Disease as a child are immune and cannot get the disease again.

For pregnant women it is advised to contact the family doctor.

The disease is a virus settling in the throat of a person/child. Being in the vicinity of a person carrying the virus may be contagious. Sneezing and coughing can spread the virus. Not everybody is susceptible though.

Use paper towels or paper handkerchief when sneezing or coughing. Or use the elbow to sneeze and/or cough in. Discard of the handkerchief. Wash your hands. Remind children to cover their mouth when sneezing/coughing.

Dear Parent/Carers,

#### **Absence During Term Time**

I am writing to introduce myself as your Education Welfare Officer for Defence Children's Services. My role is to support schools, pupils, and parents to ensure attendance is maximised in school. I offer informal support to Service Personnel and entitled MOD civilians who have been identified as requiring early intervention.

The role of The Education Welfare Officer is to replicate where practicably possible the formal Education Welfare Process for children and young people who have been identified as Persistent Absentees (below 90% as outlined by The Department for Education). However, we are fully aware that being part of the MOD can have its challenges for families especially due to living overseas.

We understand that there may be occasions when a child might be absent from school – for example, if unwell. We also understand on occasions there may be compassionate or exceptional circumstances for an absence to be authorised such as Post Operational Leave. However, we request other absences should be kept to a minimum and parents should avoid taking children out of school during term-time to go on a holiday.

Please also refer to your child's school attendance policy along with JSP 342 Education of Service Children & young people and JSP 760 Tri-Service Regulations for Leave and Other Types of Absence.

Please be aware if the absence request is not authorised by the school and the absence is still taken, this will remain unauthorised. If leave is granted but your child remains absent for longer than agreed, then this extra time will be recorded as an unauthorised absence.

If leave of absence is taken and children are off school further for additional reasons this also impacts attendance. The diagram below highlights for you lost learning from absences over an academic year. Please be aware if your child's attendance is below 90%, they may fall under the radar of the Education Welfare Officer who supports school with their military family's attendance matters. As per the DfE the guidance outlines attendance between **96 – 100% is deemed as good**. 90% attendance may sound good however over your child's academic career this equates to a year and a half of lost learning.

I understand this can be confusing and the Education Welfare Team is here to support and help navigate you as a family through your child's learning journey with all attendance related matters and can offer both formal and informal support.

# Attendance

It is really important that we work together to do all we can to prioritise children's attendance at school so that they can enjoy their learning and socialising with their peers. The profile of attendance is a key priority for schools and as school has returned to normal following Covid restrictions we have been instructed to adhere strictly to school policy.



Our attendance target is 96%. To achieve this a child should have less than 7 days absence across the school year. Our current whole school attendance is 95.42%.

#### Reporting Absence

Unplanned Absence e.g. your child is unable to attend due to ill health

Parents must notify the school on the first day of an unplanned absence by 0900 or as soon as practically possible. Parents should email british.office@afnorth-is.com or call 045 5278241 to report an unplanned absence. Absence due to illness will be authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness. If the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask parents to provide medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence.

#### Leave in Term Time

We recognise the challenges our parents face when living overseas. However, regular attendance at school is vital in helping children to achieve their full potential and get the best possible start in life.

#### Authorised and Unauthorised Absence

Headteachers may not grant leave of absence to pupils during term time unless they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'. Examples of 'exceptional circumstances' include:

- a. bereavement or serious illness of relatives.
- b. medical needs where treatment is required in the Home Country.
- c. where delivery of the Defence Mission by service parents employed in specific roles impacts on the ability to observe standard leave patterns.

The school considers each application for term-time absence individually, taking into account the specific facts, circumstances, current attendance figure, and relevant context behind the request. The headteacher may choose to discuss a request with their local Assistant Chief Education Officer (ACEO); however, a leave of absence is granted entirely at the headteacher's discretion.

Valid reasons for authorised absence include:

- a. Illness and medical/dental appointments.
- b. Religious observance where the day is exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the pupil's parents belong.
- c. Post Operational Leave.
